Archdiocesan Diploma in Catechetics

Next month (November) the Archdiocesan Catechetical Commission will launch an online Diploma in Catechetics. It will be aimed especially at any of our lay people who are involved in the catechetical work of the Church, e.g. children's liturgists, RCIA team members, teachers, youth group leaders etc., but it will be open to anyone who wants to learn more about their faith and who wants to deepen in their understanding of Catholic theology.

- The course will be run over a year (January - December 2021) and will be coordinated by Sr. Anna Marie McGuan, whom I have appointed as Archdiocesan Catechetical Advisor.
- It will consist of 6 modules of 6 classes each and will be taught in weekly 45-minute lectures (Thursday evenings at 7:30pm). Assessment will take the form of an oral interview via Zoom at the end of each module.
- It will be taught by a variety of religious and diocesan priests, lay people and religious sisters.

There will be an introductory online session for anyone interested in finding out more about the Diploma on **24 November 2020** and the course will begin officially on 12 January 2021. There will be a nominal cost for the Diploma (£100 per person) which can be paid by the parish for any parish catechists. Financial assistance is available for anyone in financial difficulty.

In these days of enforced social isolation and of limited possibilities to bring people together, I think this is an excellent initiative and I would very much like to see as many people as possible participate in it. Please bring the Diploma to the attention of your people and please encourage them to think about taking part.

A cross-party group of MPs from the three largest parties in the UK Parliament have come together to bring forward the Abortion (Cleft lip, cleft palate and club foot) Bill. The Bill will change the law to clarify that cleft palate, cleft lip, and club foot are not grounds for abortion in the UK.

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Using your Gifts – Matthew 25:14-30

Adults: What gift have you not developed as you had hoped? What could you still do?

Children: What gift has God given you? What do you want to do with it?

Gospel, Matthew 25:14-30 – The bridegroom is here. Go out and meet him.

Jesus spoke this parable to his disciples:

“The kingdom of heaven is like a man on his way abroad, who summoned his servants and entrusted his property to them. To one he gave five talents, to another two, to a third one: each in proportion to his ability. Then he set out. The man who had received the five talents promptly went and traded with them and made five more. The man who had received two made two more in the same way. But the man who had received one went off and dug a hole in the ground and hid his master’s money. Now a long time after, the master of those servants came back and went through his accounts with them. The man who had received five talents came forward bringing five more. ‘Sir’ he said, ‘you entrusted me with five talents; here are five more that I have made.’ His master said to him. ‘Well done, good and faithful servant; you have shown you can be faithful in small things. I will trust you with greater; come and join in your master’s happiness.’ Next the man with the two talents came forward. ‘Sir,’ he said, ‘you entrusted me with two talents; here are two more that I have made.’ His master said to him, ‘Well done, good and faithful servant; you have shown you can be faithful in small things. I will trust you with greater; come and join in your master’s happiness.’ Last came forward the man who had the one talent. ‘Sir,’ said he ‘I had heard you were a hard man, reaping where you have not sown and gathering where you have not scattered; so I was afraid, and I went off and hid your talent in the ground. Here it is; it was yours, you have it back.’ But his master answered him, ‘You wicked and lazy servant! So you knew that I reap where I have not sown and gather where I have not scattered? Well then, you should have deposited my money with the bankers, and on my return, I would have recovered my capital with interest. So now, take the talent from him and give it to the man who has the five talents. For to everyone who has will be given more, and he will have more than enough; but from the man who has not, even what he has will be taken away. As for this good-for-nothing servant, throw him out into the dark, where there will be weeping and grinding of teeth.”
